Do you ever find yourself asking that question of someone or maybe of yourself?
As we begin the season of Advent, perhaps we can ask ourselves:



Who am I waiting for? Who are we waiting for?

During these weeks of Advent we are bombarded with advertisements, a never ending flurry of Carols and large bustling crowds. Some quiet and peace in order to reflect on that question, "Who am I waiting for" seems almost impossible to achieve.

But maybe we can make a conscious effort during these sacred days to stop and ponder the question for our self.

"Who are we waiting for" is a challenge which might best be reflected on in small groups: families, colleagues and communities. Advent invites us to recall Christ's coming as the Word made flesh among us some 2,000 years ago. No matter if we ask what, or who are we waiting for, we have the assurance of the promise of God and the gifts of faith, light and encouragement as we wait together.

"In the Footsteps of the first Sisters of Charity"

- Hobart Pilgrimage November 2022

Our pilgrimage commenced at the statues of the convict women and the little orphan boy Toby at Constitution Dock Hobart. Our Pilgrimage was led by Sr Maria Wheeler. Sister Maria shared her vast knowledge with us with facts, stories and little anecdotes. This provided us with an insight into the ministries of the three sisters who disembarked in Hobart 1847.

The Sisters of Charity was founded by Mary Akenhead as a response to the poverty and deprivation she saw around her in Ireland. The new congregation was created specifically to witness the love of Christ for those most in need.

Thousands of convict women and children were sent to Hobart and their circumstances were dire.

Given this mission the three Sisters, Mother John Cahill, Mother de Sales O'Brien and Mother Xavier Williams commenced their work in order to relieve the suffering of the women and children. They focused on the health, education and spiritual needs of those who came into their care.

We were fortunate to visit sites of significance where we shared a reflection led by Sister Maria on the work of the Sisters and the hardships they and the women and children endured.

The sites included St Aloysius and Mount Carmel Colleges, The Cascades Female Factory, St Joseph's Church, where we celebrated Mass, the site of the first St Joseph's school and the Graves of the Sisters. The legacy and the memory of Mother Mary Aikenhead and her Sisters are clearly evident in the schools with murals and foundation walks depicting Mary bidding farewell to her Sisters and the arrival and the work of the Sisters in Hobart.

Our Pilgrimage group Included Sisters Margaret Sapsford and Libbey Byrne and MAM Trustees Professor Michael Drew and Margaret McKenna. The rest of us came from all areas of the "jigsaw" of Services.

We were very grateful to be given time to reflect on the work of the sisters who arrived in Hobart and for the work continued by the Sisters of Charity over many years. It was also an opportunity to take time from our busy lives for personal reflection on our relations with family, friends, colleagues and the community.

It was a privilege to be given this opportunity and many thanks to Mary Aikenhead Ministries, the Sisters of Charity, Sister Maria for her leadership and insights and to Angela Thomas from MAM who organised everything so beautifully.

UNANIMA International

Sr Suzette Clark writes: Recently, I attended the UNANIMA International (UI) Board Meeting in New York, the first face-to-face Meeting since COVID.

UNANIMA International is a Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) working to bring the voices of Women and Children to the United Nations (UN) and the international community. Specific issues include Homeless and Displaced, Migrants and Refugees and the Environment.

One of the riches of UI is its Board being composed of women from various countries. They bring with them the experiences of their Congregations working at the grass roots level. UI has 22 members - female Religious Congregations, with 23,000 women who are present in 85 countries.

Staff in New York engage in international advocacy, while UI members work at the local level, collaborating with local communities. This combination of advocacy at the UN and grassroots experience enables good things to happen. In early 2020, for the first time in the history of the United Nations, at the 58th Social Commission for Development, Homelessness was discussed as part of the priority theme "Affordable Housing and Social Protection to Systems for all Address Homelessness" definition and Homelessness was accepted. UI staff had submitted proposals, supported by research and the stories contributed by members.

A highlight of the Board Meeting was a recording of the presentation of the International Woman of Courage Award 2021. The recipient was Maria Jose Cavalcante of the land settlement Flor do Bosque in the State of Alagoas, Brazil. She is, in her words, a local peasant, who struggles for the right of women to land and for toxic free agriculture. Visit UNANIMA International at: https://unanima-international.org/


